Chris Dufresne of LA Times becomes new FWAA President

Chris Dufresne, a long-time sports writer for the *Los Angeles Times*, became the Football Writer Association of America's 70th President on Jan. 7 at the organization's annual awards breakfast in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. He is the paper's second FWAA President, but the first since Paul Zimmerman in 1958, the year Dufresne was born.

Dufresne, 54, will preside over the FWAA during a college football season in which the Rose Bowl will celebrate its 100th game on Jan. 1, 2014, and five days later host the Bowl Championship Series 1-2 Game in Pasadena.

Dufresne grew up in California and really has never left the state.

Just out of high school in 1976 he started loading papers at the *Los Angeles Times* dock, which is now a cafeteria. He helped do that for five years while attending California State University-Fullerton where he was Sports Editor of the *Daily Titan* in 1980.

"One of the finest newspaper loaders in the history of newspaper loaders," Dufresne says now in jest. "A terrific but demanding job in which bundles would fall on your head if you weren't careful...or you could fall off the (Continued on page 8)

FWAA Supports the ACC's **Injury Reporting Policy**

In action taken at an FWAA Meeting on Jan. 6 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, the FWAA Board voiced support of the Atlantic Coast Conference "Injury Release Guideline." The FWAA Board urges other conferences to adhere to such a consistent policy.

Under the ACC policy, approved by the league coaches, once the season starts the coaches defer all injury questions to the primary sports medicine contact for football.

On each Monday during the season, the school announces "any players who are out for the season or are scheduled to have surgery." Two days before any football game the rest of the season, and within 90 minutes of the end of practice, schools must announce injury status probable, questionable, doubtful, out.

Rose Bowl-FWAA

The Rose Bowl has enlisted the FWAA to serve as its voting body for

its "Rose Bowl Game Hall of Fame All-Century Class" commemorating the 100th Rose Bowl Game to be played on Jan. 1, 2014. The Rose Bowl's voting will center on selecting one legend (either a coach or a player) from each of the 10 decades that the game has been played.

The FWAA will provide a geographically representative body of voters who will select the All-Century Class. It will be announced on the BCS Selection Sunday in December with the presence of the legendary players selected or with a relative or relatives in attendance for those who are deceased.

FWAA board member Malcolm Moran has moved from Penn State University to the position of director of the National Sports Journalism Center based in Indianapolis. Moran was the inaugural Knight Chair in Sports Journalism and Society in the College of Communications at Penn State. In his new job, Moran will oversee "programming for the center, which serves as a comprehensive institute for the study of sports journalism. It is connected with the Indiana University School of Journalism at IUPUI.



Dufresne, while attending college, in his spare time played in a rock band and was the lead singer of the Shades, which performed at roller rinks and sold-out halfway houses. He started at the *Los Angeles Times* in 1981 and covered high schools.

"Big break was (when I was) named to cover the LA Express of the fledgling USFL in 1983 when I met two very important Youngs," Dufresne remembered. "Steve Young, who became quarterback in 1984 and Sheila Young, former Stanford volleyball player who worked in Express PR and became my wife in 1986."

He was the Los Angeles Rams beat writer from 1986 -90, then moved to the Los Angeles Raiders for a couple of seasons, before being named enterprise/features writer, which also has led to his coverage of six Olympic games, primarily as an Alpine Ski writer.

In October 1995, he became the Los Angeles Times' college/football basketball columnist and has held that

position since, while also mixing in major golf coverage in the spring and summers.

Dufresne says his best sporting coverage moment was in college football — at the Orange Bowl the day after Thanksgiving in 1984. He was standing next to the end zone where Boston College quarterback Doug Flutie heaved his game-winning pass to beat the Miami Hurricanes in one of the greatest finishes ever to a college or professional game.

"My career almost ended before it started," Dufresne recalled. "I was a young kid on the staff who got handed the assignment because no one wanted to travel on Thanksgiving. I almost missed the red eye flight on Thanksgiving night from LAX to Miami. Those were days when you could actually get the flight attendant to open the cabin door after it was closed! I often imagine what would have happened in my career had I missed Flutie's game that day."

should contain only your story and your identifying information)

At the top of each entry, the following information should be included:

- Writer or writers
- Publication or online service
- Category
- Date of publication

• E-mail address and telephone number for the writer or writers of the entry.

Entries will be sorted and stripped of identifying information and forwarded to the judges.

• Files containing your entries should follow this naming convention: yourname-category.doc

• The category must be one of these four words: Game, Feature, Enterprise or Column

• Example: KenStephens-game.doc

Only entries sent electronically will be accepted and all entries will be sorted and stripped of identifying information and forwarded to the judges.

Emily Alford of Tupelo, Miss., wins Volney Meece Scholarship

Emily Alford, a senior at Tupelo High School in Tupelo, Miss., has been named the 16th winner of the Volney Meece Scholarship.

The scholarship is awarded annually by the Football Writers Association of America and named for the late Volney Meece, who served 22 years as the FWAA's executive director and was the organization's president in 1971.

The scholarship is a \$1,000 annual grant for four years. It is given to a deserving son or daughter of an FWAA member.

The 18-year-old Alford is the daughter of longtime FWAA member Parrish Alford of the *Northwest Missis-sippi Daily Journal*.

Emily's academic record at Tupelo High School includes membership in the National Honor Society and a fixture on the school's Honor Roll all four years. Emily accumulated a 3.968 GPA while taking several accelerated, advanced placement and honor courses. In addition to her academic achievements, Emily has been involved in numerous extracurricular projects at school, in the community and with her church. Some of those activities include membership in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Future Educators of American, Mississippi All State Honor Choir, Calvary Baptist Church Tornado Relief Volunteer, Bible Club Leader, Calvary Baptist Church Ecuador Mission Trip and Vacation Bible School Teacher.

Dr. Suzy White Williams, director of several of Emily's choral activities, wrote in her letter of recommendation: "Emily has excellent rapport with teachers, students and administrators. She is self-assured and self-motivated and handles the stress associated with school and activities easily. I have rarely met a student upon whom I can rely as much as Emily."

Scheduled to graduate May 17, Emily plans to attend Mississippi State University.
