

FWAA, Armed Forces Bowl join to create new award

The Football Writers Association of America has joined with the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl to initiate

the Armed Forces Merit Award. It honors an individual or a group within the realm of the sport of football that has created, developed or produced a program that provides care, concern and support for past or present members of the United States armed forces or their families.

The Armed Forces Merit Award will be awarded for the first time before the playing of the 2012 Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl. Nominations for the Armed Forces Merit Award will be accepted this summer with the selection process beginning in October. The inaugural recipient will be announced in November on Veteran's Day.

The 10th annual Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl will be played on Saturday, Dec. 29, 2012, featuring schools from Conference USA and the Mountain West Conference. Kickoff is set for 10:45 a.m. (CST) at the newly renovated 45,000-seat Amon G. Carter Stadium in Fort Worth, Texas. The game will air on ESPN and ESPN Radio.

"We are excited to become more

involved with the Football Writers Association of America by jointly initiating our award to recognize the achieve-

ments of an individual or group from the realm of football that has successfully produced a program to benefit our country's armed forces" said Brant B. Ringler, executive director of the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl.

"There are numerous individuals and groups in our country that have devoted a lot of time, energy and financial backing to support programs associated with the armed forces and their families," said Steve Richardson, executive director of the FWAA. "By teaming with the Bell Helicopter Armed Forces Bowl, the FWAA will help recognize

these groups or people. Within the FWAA, we also have members who have military backgrounds, either as enlisted men or with relatives who have served this country. Additionally, this will be meaningful to them."

The Armed Forces Merit Award will be selected by a panel of individuals from the Football Writers Association of America and the Bell Helicopter Armed (*Continued on page 5*)

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STEVE RICHARDSON On the evening of July 21, the FWAA is involved in a very important ceremony. Longtime FWAA member Dave Sittler will receive the Bert McGrane Award in South Bend, Indiana.

Sittler's name will follow 38 others who already have their names on a large plaque in the rotunda of the Col-

lege Football Hall of Fame.

Current FWAA president Lenn Robbins of the *New York Post* will handle the presentation.

Since the South Bend Hall is scheduled to close this fall, this will be the last time the winner of our Bert McGrane Award will be saluted there. The National Football Foundation has plans to move the Hall to Atlanta and re-open it in the fall of 2014. The FWAA will continue to be part of the College Football Hall of Fame enshrinement program as it makes the transition to Atlanta and home there.

Along with countless boxes of other memorabilia, our plaque will make the trip to the Southeast in one of five large trucks. The McGrane Award, symbolic of the association's Hall of Fame, is presented to an FWAA member who has performed great service to the organization or the writing profession. It is named after McGrane, a Des Moines, Iowa, writer who was the executive secretary of the FWAA from the early 1940s until 1973.

Sittler's acceptance of the Bert McGrane Award will coincide with his retirement year. Dave, 66, stepped down as a full-time columnist at the *Tulsa World* this past winter. He hopes to write occasional columns and also appear on a radio talk show in the area. But an end to an era in Oklahoma sports is occurring at the paper.

Dave also has been the face of our Volney Meece Award program (so named

after our late, long-time executive director) since it started in the mid-1990s.

Since that time, the FWAA has given away thousands of dollars over the years to deserving students. Sittler, the 2001 FWAA president and a member since 1973, first proposed the idea of the Volney Meece Scholarship. He has been the only selection chairman the award has known. The annual \$1,000 grant, which has been awarded since 1997 and is renewable for up to four years, is given to a deserving son or daughter of an FWAA member.

His administration of that program in itself would be enough to warrant the



McGrane for Sittler. But the fact that he has been an always steady and sometimes relentless journalist over the years is an added bonus.

Sittler grew up in Nebraska and was raised on Bob Devaney, but much of his Nebraska career covered Tom Osborne. That could be

worth one book, dealing with those contrasting personalities. Then later, he had another dose of contrasts in Barry Switzer and ultimately Bob Stoops at Oklahoma.

I think I can say this over the years: Dave was not always the most popular person in either Nebraska or Oklahoma. Nor should he have been. He had the gumption to challenge the legends when they needed to be challenged, praised them when they needed to be praised, and stayed neutral when he needed to be neutral. The latter quality is something many younger journalists should take note.

Dave never stirred up news or made the headlines about himself. He covered the news in a professional manner. Too many times, Dave stayed long into the night in press boxes helping or waiting for fellow workers to finish. He did his job and probably that of some others during his stints in Nebraska and Oklahoma. I think all of those people had respect for Dave and the job he did. I know I did.

FWAA lists players to watch for Bronko Nagurski Trophy

The Football Writers Association of America has announced its annual Bronko Nagurski watch list for the 2012 season. There were 84 players on the initial list that highlights the top defenders in college football for this upcoming season.

Players from the Southeastern, Big 12, Big Ten, Pacific 12 and Atlantic Coast conferences dominated the field of candidates. The players were pretty equally divided among linemen, linebackers and defensive backs.

The FWAA will name a Defensive Player of the Week during the regular season. Five finalists for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy will be named on Nov. 15. The winner

News and Notes: Catching up with FWAA members, events

RETIREMENTS:

Mike DeArmond (Kansas City Star) left the paper, retiring in February 2012 after 40 years on the job at the same newspaper. How is that for longevity? In addition to covering University of Missouri sports the last two decades, DeArmond also covered eight Olympic Games, chronicled George Brett's chase for .400 in 1980 and worked as an assistant sports editor and assistant city editor for the newspaper.

Natalie Meisler retired from the Denver Post in November 2011. Natalie spent most of her writing career at the newspaper (since 1977) after graduating from Colorado in 1973. She is a former member of the FWAA Board and covered college sports (Colorado and Colorado State) and bicycle races for much of her 34-plus years at the newspaper.

Dave Sittler, an FWAA past president (2001) and Bert McGrane winner (2012) retired from his full-time job this past winter as columnist at the Tulsa World. He was named the winner of the McGrane Award in January and will be honored on July 21 in South Bend, Ind., at the College Football Hall of Fame. Pat Forde has left ESPN.com to join Yahoo! Sports. ... Shelly Poe left Ohio State to become Assistant AD for Football Communications at Auburn University. ... Ben Blevins left the sports information office at Duke to join the one at the University of Texas. ... Joe Hornstein, formerly the sports information director at Central Florida, now holds a similar position at Florida International University. ... Jack Bogaczyk has left the Charleston Daily Mail and has become Director of Publications and Editor of the Herd Insider at Marshall University. ... Austin Ward resigned from the Knoxville News Sentinel to join ESPN.com and cover Ohio State. ... Steve Wieberg has left USA Today and will go into the educational field. Reed. Nesbitt, an English major who just completed his junior year, is the managing sports editor for the *Michigan Daily*.

DEATHS:

Longtime Atlanta Journal-Constitution columnist Furman Bisher passed away on March 18, 2012, after a heart attack. Bisher had been a member of the FWAA for 62 years and was a past president of the organization (1959) and a Bert McGrane Award winner (1982). He was 93. Until recent years he had still been writing a column for the newspaper and had been a fixture at The Masters, Kentucky Derby and Georgia-Georgia Tech football games for more than 50 years. ... Arnie Burdick, 92, an FWAA past president (1966), passed away on June 5, 2012. He was a former SID for Syracuse and later worked at the Syracuse Herald-Journal, where he was sports editor and columnist for 28 years. In 1986, he became the media director for the Heritage Golf Tournament in Hilton Head, S.C., and later retired there. He worked his 29th Heritage this past spring.

And I think ultimately, all those sources that Dave covered over the years had that same respect. I know because I saw it with my own eyes.

Several years ago, the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) used to have a golf tournament and then a party at the Stadium Club involving the Dallas Cowboys at the old Texas Stadium in Irving. The head coach of the Cowboys sometimes attended (not Tom Landry, of course, but those after him). This particular year, in the mid 1990s, Dave was there. And so was I. The head coach, as the party was about to be put to bed, summoned Dave and gave friendly audience. And I got to come along for the ride.

Barry Switzer hadn't coached a game yet in Dallas.

But the friendly wait staff of Texas Stadium certainly learned that the King wasn't short on words. A couple of hours later, at a small table with a spotlight on it in a darkened stadium, Switzer was still talking. Dave was listening. So was I.

Dave could develop sources, write about coaches and still have a relationship after it was all said and done. I think he needs to teach a journalism class somewhere — because that is an art. It's something he needs to pass on to others.

In any event, Dave's reporting skills and presence as a writer will be missed by the *Tulsa World*. We expect him to continue as the Volney Meece Award gatekeeper and maybe serve on an FWAA occasional committee. He's too valuable of a resource for us to let go.

FWAA rolls out 2012 Outland Trophy watch list

DALLAS — Senior Barrett Jones from defending national champion Alabama heads a list of 71 players from 11 conferences and two independents on the prestigious 2012 Outland Trophy watch list.

The 6-foot-5, 302-pound Jones, who has switched from offensive tackle to center, will seek to become only the second player in history to win back-to-back Outland Trophies. Nebraska center Dave Rimington, in 1981-82, is the only player to pull off the double.

The Outland Trophy, presented annually since 1946, is the third oldest award in major college football. The winner of the 67th Outland Trophy, named after the late John Outland, an All-America lineman at

The FWAA All-America Committee, after voting input from the entire membership, selects the 25-man team and eventually the three Outland finalists. Committee members, by individual ballot, select the winner.
