Baseball America Names Houston's Sullivan its Summer Player of the Year

After a dazzling off-season, University of Houston pitcher Brad Sullivan was named the 2002 Summer National Player of the Year by Baseball America magazine on Friday. Sullivan, who became both the Cougars' and Conference USA's first-ever consensus All-American at the end of the 2002 collegiate season, was one of four starting pitchers named to the All-Summer team.

With the numbers that he posted as a member of the 2002 Team USA National Team, it was no surprise that Sullivan would be named to the All-America Team. In seven games, he assembled an amazing 0.72 ERA with 56 strikeouts and only 36 hits in 56.0 innings of work.

He collected two wins over the Japanese Collegiate All-Stars in July on the way to being named the Series Most Valuable Player. A few weeks later, he pushed Team USA into the first-ever FISU World University Baseball Championship game with a 2-1 victory over Japan.

David Purcey (Oklahoma), Kyle Sleeth (Wake Forest) and Jered Weaver (Long Beach State) were the other starting pitchers on the Baseball America squad. Sleeth joined Sullivan as a member of Team USA during the summer.

BASEBALL AMERICA, USA BASEBALL Note Top 25 College Producers for Olympics, National Teams;

Since USA Baseball began selecting players and operating an official National Team to represent the United States in 1984, close to 350 collegiate players have donned the Red, White, and Blue uniform from 115 colleges and universities.

But there is clearly one campus that has consistently produced more USA Baseball National Team players and candidates than any other: **Stanford University**. The Pac-10 powerhouse topped the list in a recent study done by USA Baseball that ranks the Top 25 Collegiate Baseball Programs that have produced National Team players since 1984.

The most impressive number is the fact that the Cardinal has placed a member of their roster on the USA Baseball National Team in an amazing 17 of 19 years, including each of the last 16 consecutive summers beginning in 1986. Overall, Stanford has produced a total of 20 National Team members, which is seven more than the **University of Miami (Fla)**. The Hurricanes finished second in the rankings, with a total of 13 players produced in 12 different years. Rounding out the top five campuses are: 3) **Cal State Fullerton**; 4) **Southern California**; and 5) **Georgia Tech**.

Major League Baseball, World Authorities, USOC, Discuss Baseball's Continued Olympics Association BASEBALL LEADERS MEET IN NEW YORK TO DISCUSS OLYMPICS

Major League Baseball President & COO Robert DuPuy, Major League Baseball Players Association Executive Director Donald Fehr, International Baseball Federation President Aldo Notari, United States Olympic Committee President Marty Mankamyer and USA Baseball President Mike Gaski met in New York on Sept. 23 as part of a continuation of meetings to ensure that baseball remains an Olympic sport. Baseball's leaders will next meet on October 3 in Switzerland with International Olympic Committee President Dr. Jacques Rogge where they will discuss baseball's place as a global sport. In August, 2002, the IOC Program Commission recommended to the IOC Executive Committee that three sports (Baseball, Softball, Modern Pentathlon) be excluded from the Olympics beginning with the 2008 Games in Beijing. The IOC Executive Committee will decide whether to accept the recommendation at a meeting in Mexico City on November 25-26. If the IOC Executive Committee accepts the recommendation the full IOC membership would make the final decision on November 27.

"Baseball is amongst the world's most popular sports," said Major League Baseball President Robert DuPuy. "With 112 countries hosting Federations and nearly a quarter of Major League Baseball players born outside the United States, we believe that baseball meets the criteria of an Olympic sport and are confident that the IOC Executive Committee will agree."

"Today's meeting was an important step in securing baseball's much-deserved place as an Olympic sport," said Donald Fehr, Executive Director of the Major League Baseball Players Association. "Given the continued growth in baseball's popularity around the world, we are confident that baseball merits its place in the Olympics."

"I am very happy with today's meeting as it exhibits the unity that exists amongst baseball's leadership," said International Baseball Federation President Aldo Notari. "It is clear to me that baseball should remain in the Olympic program."

Nebraska's Jo Potuto Named 2002 Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative

NCBWA member and University of Nebraska faculty athletics representative Josephine "Jo" Potuto, J.D., has been named National Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation on Sept. 12 at the Chicago Athletic Club. Potuto, NU's Institutional Representative and Faculty Representative to the NCAA and Big 12 Conference, is on the NCBWA's Awards and Dick Howser Trophy committees. She also is a member of the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions and the NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championship Committee. In her sixth year at Nebraska, Potuto also serves as the Big 12 liaison to the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association. "Joe Potuto is an incredible Faculty Athletics Representative," said Nebraska Director of Athletics Bill Byrne. "She works hard on behalf of the University of Nebraska and represents us well at both the Big 12 and the NCAA. I could not be more pleased to have her honored in this way. She deserves all the accolades there are in this business. "The All-American Football Foundation recognizes individuals who excel in intercollegiate athletics as well as coaches, directors of athletics and faculty who contribute to the sport and college athletics, in general.

Graham Hires New Assistant Coach at Rice

David Pierce has been named an assistant baseball coach at Rice University, head coach Wayne Graham announced on Sept. 24. Pierce, who has spent the last two seasons as an assistant at the University of Houston, will replace Chris Rupp as a Rice assistant. Rupp was named head coach at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville earlier this month. "I don't think we could have done better," said Graham. "He has a great background in his playing career and as a coach, both at the high school and college levels. He's a perfect for us because he has hitting expertise and outfield expertise." Pierce is also a former Rice assistant coach, serving one season (1991) under the late David Hall. He later was head coach for five seasons at Pasadena's Dobie High, where he led the Longhorns to three District 23-5A championships and three berths in the Region III semifinals. Among his honors at Dobie was winning the district coach of the year award three times, and being tabbed a coach on the Houston area all-star series and a coach in the U.S. Junior Olympic trials.

Ohio State Has Solid Ohio (Eight) Freshmen Crop; Finishes Fall Drills on Oct. 7

Ohio State baseball coach Bob Todd welcomed eight freshmen to his program when classes at the university began on Wednesday. The team officially began fall practice Sept. 9. "The thing I like about this class is their athleticism," Todd said. "Since we began practice earlier this month, they have shown they have a strong work ethic. I like their attitude. It is awfully difficult for a freshman to get a lot of playing time, but there are some players in key positions that will push some of our upperclassmen." Two righthanded pitchers, two infielders, two outfielders and two players, who could play either as an outfielder or infielder, make up the class, which is made up entirely of former Ohio high school players. The class consists of Doug Carpenter (RHP, Bryan, Ohio/Bryan); Trey Fausnaugh (RHP, Circleville, Ohio/Westfall); Jacob Howell (OF, Ashland, Ohio/Ashland); Philip Mattingly (IF, Toledo, Ohio/Ottawa Hills); Kris Moorman (IF/OF, St. Henry, Ohio/St. Henry); Wes Schirtzinger (IF, Westerville, Ohio/Westerville North); Jedidiah Stephen (IF/OF, Caldwell, Ohio/Shenandoah); and, Drew Thomas (OF, Mechanicsburg, Ohio/Briggs).

Stanford Unveils 2003 Schedule

Stanford Baseball has announced its schedule for the 2003 season. The Cardinal will open its 2003 campaign at Santa Clara on Saturday, January 25, before the Broncos return the favor for Stanford's home opener the following day on Super Bowl Sunday, January 26. Stanford will be attempting to extend its school record of College World Series appearances to five. The Cardinal was CWS runners-up in 2000 and 2001. Stanford's 2003 schedule includes 34 home games and 23 contests against teams that participated in the 2002 NCAA Tournament, including a three-game series at defending national champion Texas. "It's a tough schedule once again, especially for a young time like ours," said Stanford head coach Mark Marquess. "We have many challenging non-league games against many teams that will be highly ranked. Hopefully, that will help prepare us for a Pac-10 schedule that is always difficult." Stanford's schedule includes six games versus Pac-10 rivals USC and California. The Cardinal will host both teams in non-conference action with USC coming to "The Farm" for a three-game series February 28-March 2 and California trekking across the Bay for three games March 7-9. Stanford visits the Trojans for a three-game Pac-10 series May 2-4 and then travels to California for a three-game conference set May 9-11.

New Harglo Baseball Pitching Machine Introduced

Harglo Industries Inc. announces the "Bee Ball TM" machine, a computer controlled professional baseball pitching machine. The onboard PC contains programs for nine basic pitches. Pitch setup date can be sequenced to deliver a different pitch every seven seconds. Each pitch can be programmed to land in the same location or a different location. A variety of pitch types such as a fastball, curve, slider, change up, etc., can be thrown at varying speeds up to 100 mph.

A visual light system lets the batter know that the next pitch is forthcoming. The ball hopper will hold up to 100 balls. The operator can set the time between pitches from seven to fifteen seconds. The first pitch of a practice cession can be delayed up to two minutes so the batter can get in position.

Several versions are being offered beyond the basic version. One has a compact disk reader with a library of available preprogrammed pitches on CD's. Another version includes a wireless hand held remote control that allows the batting coach to select each pitch and ball speed. For those who want to create their own pitch sequences, this version includes the necessary software and instructions.

The "Bee Ball TM" machine is mobile and can be easily moved from one location to another. It can be used outside in a batting cage, on the playing field or inside a batting tunnel. It operates on standard 115 vac, 25 amp power. Normal setup time is about 10 minutes.

The basic "Bee Ball TM" machine sells for \$49,000.00. The prices for the additional versions are not set at this time. Discounts are available for volume units and for customers that place their order prior to the next production run of twenty machines. Harglo Industries Inc. has plans to ramp up the production in Fremont, Calif., and is now seeking interested investors to participate in this new and exciting product for the world of base ball.
