

NCBWA PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Another college baseball season has come and gone and eyes are already looking forward to 2010 in what will obviously be a very memorable one, concluding with the final College World Series played at historic Rosenblatt Stadium. Let there be no doubt the 2010 CWS will be one that lives on forever.

The 2009 College World Series, the 30th in a row covered by ESPN, was the most-viewed and highest-rated in ESPN and ESPN2 history -- including the best-of-three Championship Series between LSU and Texas -- while posting significant audience increases over 2008. The Championship Series produced three of ESPN's top four most-viewed NCAA College World Series telecasts ever, highlighted by the most-viewed and second highest-rated for the decisive Game 3 which averaged 2,303,000 households; 3,160,000 viewers; and a 2.3 rating.

Indeed, we are in the "Golden Age" of college baseball and it should continue to grow even larger. One item missed by some but certainly one that should be noted was the NCAA's new designation of men's college baseball as a "revenue" sport (along with football and basketball) in the April 2009 release of baseball's APR numbers, numbers by the way that saw baseball with one of the largest increases and improvements among all NCAA sanctioned sports.

There are several other items to keep an eye on as the 2010 college season approaches. One will be how college baseball will be affected by the current questions throughout the country on whether to continue the printing of media guides. There is also a proposal by the NCAA Baseball Rules Committee to issue an immediate and indefinite moratorium on the use of composite barreled bats (AKA bat 'shaving' or 'rolling'). The committee believes this action is needed in order to protect the integrity of the game and to enhance the safety of the student-athletes.

Also worth noting was the recent defeat of a proposal to reduce the number of regular season games from 56 to 52. However, the NCAA did approve a proposal to extend the regular season by one week due to the compression of the season being problematic, giving 2010 a start date of February 19.

No matter the issue, please feel free to contact myself or any board member with your opinions and stances so the NCBWA can continue to be the leader in awareness of and dealing with the pressing issues that surround the current and future state of collegiate baseball.

I am honored and humbled to be named the 48th President of the NCBWA. A tremendous thanks to outgoing president Joe Dier for his work not just during the past year but the countless years he has served the NCBWA and college baseball. Like many in this fine organization, he has witnessed first-hand and been a large part of the tremendous growth in revenue, media attention, fan support and television exposure college baseball has enjoyed over the years.

A great deal of thanks should also go out to Russ Anderson, Mike Montoro and Bo Carter as they continue their hard work as Executive Directors of the NCBWA. These three gentlemen have overseen an organization that has grown at a pace comparable to the sport we all covet, highlighted by the inclusion of the NCBWA annual awards as part of the festivities to recognize and induct the College Baseball Hall of Fame and the inaugural College Baseball Awards Show in Lubbock, Texas in July.

One final note, new membership and renewal forms are now being distributed. Please consider passing these forms to as many of your contacts and colleagues as possible so we can continue to see this organization grow and achieve new heights.

2009-10 NCBWA OFFICERS NAMED

The National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) recently released its list of 2009-10 officers as approved recently by the organization's executive board. These officers began their duties immediately and will serve in these roles through the 2010 College World Series.

The new president is **Chuck Dunlap**, longtime baseball contact for the Southeastern Conference and representative of the NCBWA at several NCAA World Series in Omaha. Dunlap is steeped in the long Mississippi State tradition as a graduate and youthful follower of the Bulldogs and succeeds 2008-09 president Joe Dier, the 23-year chief baseball contact for MSU.

For the second straight year, the group has two female vice presidents. **Julie St. Cyr** of the Big West Conference moves from second to first vice president, while **Tami Cutler** of Wichita State advances from third to second vice president.

St. Cyr will coordinate the NCBWA Stopper of the Year nominations and voting process for 2010 as well as design and layout the organization's annual directory. Cutler will continue her outstanding work with the Pro-Line Athletic NCBWA pre- and post-season All-America teams as well as coordinating the prestigious Wilbur Snyp Award.

Ryan Bomberger of Liberty takes over as third vice president. The Flames' baseball contact has served previously on the NCBWA Board of Directors for two years and will now move into the officer rotation and begin coordination of the organization's annual Freshman All-American team.

Bo Carter begins his 10th year as executive director while **Russ Anderson**, assistant commissioner of Conference USA, starts his fifth year as associate executive director. West Virginia director of football communications **Mike Montoro** is opening his fourth year as assistant executive director. All three directors are past presidents, board members and recipients of the NCBWA Wilbur Snyp Award. In addition, Anderson has served one of the longest tenures as an officer in NCBWA history with 13 years as secretary/treasurer of the organization.

For the fifth consecutive year, nationally noted media relations directors **Bob McComas** (Division II) and **Steve Marovich** (Division III) will serve as divisional coordinators for NCBWA.

The 2009-10 Board of Directors offers a tremendous mix of geographical diversity and baseball knowledge. Alabama's **Barry Allen** returns along with Houston's **Jeff Conrad** (who will now coordinate the NCBWA Newsletter), past president Dier, Florida State's **Jason Leturmy**, and Judy Willson of **New Mexico** (who will begin coordinating the NCBWA Coach of the Year Award). Illinois' **Ben Taylor** becomes the newest board member and brings to the table a solid grasp of Big Ten Conference and Midwest Region collegiate baseball.

SDSU'S STRASBURG TAKES 23RD ANNUAL DICK HOWSER TROPHY

San Diego State's dominant right-handed pitcher **Stephen Strasburg** was the recipient of the 23rd annual Dick Howser Trophy as college baseball's player of the year.



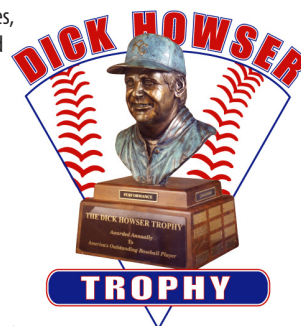
Strasburg had one of the finest single season pitching performances in 2009 as a junior right-hander for Major League Baseball Hall of Fame coach Tony Gwynn's Aztecs. The San Diego, Calif., resident was the national leader in strikeouts with 195 and No. 2 in NCAA Division I with a 1.32 ERA and hits allowed per nine innings with 5.37 to compliment a 13-1 overall record. The 2008 USA Baseball Player of the Year for all divisions, Strasburg was the first selection in the 2009 Major League Baseball free agent draft by the Washington Nationals in June.

Also a finalist for the prestigious Golden Spikes Award, the SDSU righty was the 2009 College Baseball Foundation Pitcher of the Year and totally dominated the Mountain West Conference in '09. In round-robin league play, he was 7-0 with 111 strikeouts and a 1.50 ERA in eight starts.

Overall, Strasburg (two-time MWC Pitcher of the Year as a sophomore and junior) pitched 109 innings in 15 starts, had a pair of complete games, had a hand in four shutouts (two in personal complete games), gave up 65 hits, and walked just 19 hitters in 15 contests. Opponents batted just .172 against the Aztec standout. He finished 2009 pre-NCAA activity without allowing an earned run in 50 of his 52 innings worked.

The two-time consensus All-America also whiffed 180 batters in his first two seasons at San Diego State in 2007 and '08 and was a semifinalist for the 2008 Howser Trophy. Strasburg struck out a SDSU and MWC record 23 hitters against Utah on April 11, 2008, and allowed opposing hitters a composite .136 batting average -- shattering the previous MWC season mark by 75 points. He was a relief ace for the Aztecs as a freshman with seven saves.

The presentation was made in July for the first time in Lubbock, Texas, as part

for the summer) pitching staff at 3-0 with a 1.06 ERA and 48 strikeouts in 34 innings pitched.

He was the only collegian on the '08 U.S. Olympic Team's 25-man roster and was the winning hurler against the Netherlands in pool play. He later started against Cuba in the semifinals and finished Olympic play with a 1-1 mark, 2.45 ERA and 16 strikeouts in 11 innings.

He was part of the bronze medal team, which downed fourth-place Japan on the final day of Olympic competition. The junior righty also was USA Baseball's nominee for 2008 USOC Sportsman of the Year.

Dustin Ackley • 2009 Howser Trophy Finalist

Ackley, the 2009 Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year and a junior from Walnut

Other 2009 winners denoted previously and receiving awards in Lubbock were **Addison Reed** of San Diego State as Stopper of the Year, **Ben Orloff** of UC Irvine for the Brooks Wallace Award, Brian O'Connor (special video) of Virginia as Coach of the Year, J.T. Wise of Oklahoma for the Johnny Bench Award, and Strasburg (also winner of 2009 Pitcher of the Year).

Strasburg edged out consensus All-America performers and fellow Howser Trophy finalists 1B **Dustin Ackley** of North Carolina and RHP **Mike Leake** of Arizona State. A decorated student-athlete throughout his SDSU career with a major in public administration, Strasburg chose the Aztecs over Arizona, Arizona State, UNLV, Stanford, Yale, and Harvard.

The son of Jim Strasburg and Kathleen Swett, who both attended San Diego State, took the Aztecs to their highest finish in the NCAA tournament since the school's most recent NCAA appearance in 1991.

Strasburg later "ran the table" for Player of the Year Awards when he received the USA Baseball Golden Spikes Award in St. Louis on July 14. He joins an illustrious group of 31 previous winners.

His other national honors included the Richard W. "Dick" Case Award from USA Baseball for his exemplary showings for Team USA and the U.S. Olympic baseball squad in Beijing last year. He helped pitch the national team to a first-ever, 24-0 record, the Haarlem Baseball Week title and FISU World University Championship with two victories over Cuba's top professional team.

Strasburg led a Team USA's record-setting (composite ERA of 1.94

Cove, N.C., was a consensus 2009 All-America performer. He was the second player chosen in the 2009 draft by the Seattle Mariners and led the NCAA World Series fifth-place Tar Heels with a .417 average, with 75 runs, 18 doubles, four triples, a team-leading 22 homers, 73 RBIs, .763 slugging percentage and a .512 on-base percentage of .512.

He was on NCAA Chapel Hill All-Tournament Teams and set an NCAA World Series for career hits under head coach Mike Fox.

Mike Leake • 2009 Howser Trophy Finalist

Leake, the two-time Pacific-10 Conference Pitcher of the Year in 2008 and '09, led the nation in pitching victories with a 16-1 mark with a microscopic 1.71 ERA for the national third-place Sun Devils.

The junior right-hander from Fallbrook, Calif., had seven complete games in 19 starts and was one of the real "workhorses" in college baseball in 2009 with 142 innings pitched. He tossed two shutouts and was part of another blanking.

The ace for ASU **head coach Pat Murphy** enjoyed a 7:1 strikeout-to-walk ratio with 162 whiffs and 24 walks for an average of 10.3 strikeouts every nine innings. Leake surrendered just 27 earned runs and 95 hits (5.4 each nine IP) and was among the top five in NCAA statistics in wins, strikeouts, innings pitched and walks per nine innings.

He finished his three-year career at ASA with a 40-6 mark as an All-Pac-10 hurler for the Sun Devils.

He also batted .303 as a designated hitter in 15 contests with four doubles and four RBIs as a DH.

The St. Petersburg Area Chamber of Commerce, founder and owner of the Dick Howser Trophy, has enjoyed over 100 years of community service since its founding in 1899. The organization has long been a vital force in the baseball affairs of the city, both in spring training and during the pursuit of a major league baseball franchise for the Tampa Bay area, and continues its solid role in the 21st Century. NCBWA membership includes writers, broadcasters and publicists. Designed to promote and publicize college baseball, it is the sport's only college media-related organization, and was founded in 1962.

2009 USA BASEBALL UPDATE

Team USA enjoyed another banner season with its 2009 squad of all collegiate amateur student-athletes, coaches, trainers and support personnel.

The squad, coached by veteran

Tulane mentor **Rick Jones**, closed the year at 19-5 and won the prestigious Enbridge World Baseball Challenge in Canada by topping Germany 8-1 during the final game of the summer season.

College stars again were plentiful for Team USA. Rice's **Rick Hague** led the team with a .371 batting average, three homers and 16 RBI along with Florida State's **Tyler Holt** at .371-0 HR-14 RBI. Cal State Fullerton All-America SS **Christian Colon** paced Team USA with both five homers and 37 RBI in 23 games before missing the finale with an injury.

USA pitchers, who set a summer record in 2008 with a 1.62 composite earned run average, were almost as effective in '09 with a microscopic 2.16 team ERA. Tulane's **Nick Pepitone** and Arizona State's **Matt Newman** did not allow a run in 15 2/3 total

relief frames. UCLA's **Gerrit Cole** captured over 25 percent of the all-star unit's total wins at 4-0 while **Drew Pomeranz** of Ole Miss topped the team with 48 strikeouts in 35 2/3 innings. Among the rotation starters Vanderbilt's **Sonny Gray** (0.75 ERA) and Cole (1.75 ERA) posted the best numbers.

One of the longest winning streaks in international baseball came to an end for the USA squad on July 10 when Japan's Kokusai Budo University topped the U.S. contingent 7-1 to end a 35-game skein — the longest in modern Team USA annals. That included 24 consecutive wins (all season) by the undefeated 2008 entry.

OU'S WISE NABS 2009 BENCH AWARD

Oklahoma senior **J.T. Wise** added yet another accolade to his resume' as he was named the winner of the 2009 Johnny Bench Award.

The honor, given annually to the nation's top collegiate catcher since 2000, was given out by the Hall of Fame catcher at a banquet in Wichita on June 26. Wise was recognized later at the CBF Awards Show in Lubbock on July 2 for winning the Bench Award.

Tony Sanchez from Boston College and Chris Henderson from **George Mason** were the other finalists.

He became the first Sooner to collect the award and the second catcher in the history of the Big 12 Conference (**Kelly Shoppach** - Baylor, 2001). Wise, Shoppach and **Taylor Teagarden** (2005-Texas) are the only Big 12 catchers to make the finalists' lists. Wise was a consensus All-America backstopper in '09 and later signed with the Los Angeles Dodgers after completing NCAA play.

Several of the familiar names and career updates and with longtime post-college All-Star careers (some future Cooperstown Hall of Fame members as well) in Major League Baseball are OF **Oddibe McDowell**, Arizona State, in private business in Southlake, Texas, and Dallas-Fort Worth area; OF **Rafael Palmeiro**, Mississippi State, in private business in Colleyville, Texas; DH-1B **Will Clark**, Mississippi State, in private business and working with area charities in New Orleans; 1B **Mark McGwire**, USC, roving professional hitting instructor; SS **Barry Larkin**, Michigan, private business in Orlando, Fla., admitted to the College Baseball Hall of Fame in Lubbock in 2009 along with Palmeiro (Clark was a 2007 College Hall of Fame inductee); 3B **Cory Snyder**, managing in minor league baseball after a lengthy career in the majors; OF **Chris Gwynn**, San Diego State, in private business in California.

MILESTONES

2009 seasons with historical milestones for several NCAA Division I schools were Fordham's record 150th season (missing one year because of a halt to competition during World War II), 145 historic years for Princeton and Yale baseball, North Carolina's 100th campaign, 115 baseball seasons at Washington State, Michigan State's 125th year on the diamond, and the centennial (100th) season for Oregon State, Tennessee and Wake Forest, among others.

The 2010 campaign will be the 120th season for Iowa, 105th for Oklahoma baseball, the 65th for Miami (Fla.), the 60th for Fairfield, the 110th for Nebraska, and centennial campaign for Rhode Island and Western Michigan among the anticipated group of 302 full-scale or provisional DI members (including Seattle, which is resuming varsity baseball in '10).

• USF head coach **Lelo Prado** was honored with Hillsborough County and Tampa Lelo Prado Day with a proclamation after he netted 2009 Big

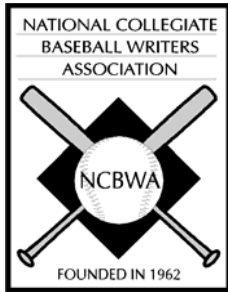
