Baseball media guides are slowly starting to find their way into mailboxes across the country. This big question is: will this be the last season that we are able to see a printed guide? That is something I'm sure media, teams and collegiate administrators anxiously await a decision on. Hopefully, we will all get that answer when the vote takes place in April.

TEXAS TOPS 2010 NCBWA PRESEASON POLL

The National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association continues its tradition of NCAA Division I polls for the 13th year with its 2010 preseason predictions and weekly surveys. Weekly polls will continue from Feb. 22 through June 29, following the NCAA College World Series in Omaha, Neb.

The 2010 poll voters come from 40 college baseball writers and related media persons from throughout the nation. After a preseason Top 35 listing, the remainder of the polls will feature a national Top 30.

The Texas Longhorns are the preseason NCBWA poll choice for the third time in history. Last year, Coach Augie Garrido's crew finished second to LSU (No. 2 in the NCBWA pre-2010 survey) in the College World Series during the next-to-last venue at historic Rosenblatt Stadium, which will be razed after the '10 CWS. The Longhorns also earned top billing in 2003 and '06, while North Carolina managed its first preseason top rating in 2009.

LSU held down the No. 1 slot in both the 1998 and 2001 NCBWA preseason selections while other No. 1 placers in the initial polls are Southern California (1999), Miami (Fla.) (2000), Stanford (2002), Cal State Fullerton (2005), Rice (2004, '07), and Arizona State (2008). The three final No. 1 choices prior to LSU in 2009 have come from the Far West in Fresno State (2008) and two-time NCAA champ Oregon State (2006 and '07).

The preseason poll has representation by 12 different conferences among the 302 baseball-playing schools in the 2010 NCAA Division I ranks. The polls of 2009 had teams from 16 different Division I conferences rated at least one week. For more information or to join the NCBWA, please go to www.ncbwa.com.

2010 COLLEGE BASEBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES ANNOUNCED

The 2010 Hall of Fame class of 10 standouts (eight players, two coaches) was recently announced at a national news conference.

Arizona State shortstop Alan Bannister, Fresno State head coach Bob Bennett, LSU first baseman Eddy Furniss, Wichita State pitcher Don Heinkel, Ceritos College head coach Wally Kincaid, Alabama first baseman Dave Magadan, Michigan outfielder/pitcher George Sisler, North Carolina catcher B.J. Surhoff, Wake Forest second baseman Chales Teague and Texas pitcher Richard Wortham became the newest members of the prestigious organization



The group includes many of the top all-time names in college baseball, and this is the fifth class for the nationally selected group, sponsored by the College Baseball Foundation and College Baseball Hall of Fame. The 2010 inductees bring the total number of Hall of Fame student-athletes and coaches to 68.

AWARD TO HONOR OLERUD, TWO-WAY BASEBALL PLAYERS

The College Baseball Foundation recently announced the creation of the John Olerud Two-Way Player of the Year Award to be presented annually as part of the College Baseball Awards Show.

Olerud, who was inducted into the National College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2007, was a standout pitcher and first baseman at Washington State University from 1987 through 1989.

"This award is a huge honor," Olerud said. "There have been a lot of great players in college baseball and for the College Baseball Foundation to name it after me, I am humbled and honored."

The inaugural Olerud Award will be presented on July 2 in Lubbock as part of the second annual College Baseball Awards Show. The awards show provides a venue to present some of the biggest awards in college baseball including the Brooks Wallace Shortstop of the Year Award, the Pitcher of the Year Award and the Dick Howser Trophy, which honors the nation's most outstanding player.

Bobo Brayton, Olerud's coach as Washington State and fellow 2007 College Base-

ball Hall of Fame inductee, said Olerud's character is what makes him a strong role model for current players.

"Naming the award after John is a great move because of the kind of person he is," Brayton said. "He is as great in the community as he was on the playing field. I commend the CBF on the creation of the John Olerud Award."

The College Baseball Awards Show is a part of a three-day celebration honoring the accomplishments of college baseball players past and present. The celebration also features the induction ceremonies for the National College Baseball Hall of Fame and the 4th on Broadway Parade and Fan Fest.

Stopper of the Year Award, given to the top relief pitcher in NCAA Division I baseball, as announced by the association.

Last year's Stopper of the Year winner, Addison Reed of San Diego State, headlines the list of preseason nominees for the 2010 award. Reed recorded a nation-leading 20 saves in 20 opportunities last season, finished the year with a microscopic 0.65 earned run average and 38 strikeouts over his 27.2 innings of work. He allowed only seven walks, with two of those being intentional passes and his save total was a new San Diego State and Mountain West Conference season record.

Reed is joined by two of the five finalists for last season's award in LSU's Matty Ott and twotime finalist Eric Pettis of UC Irvine, both NCBWA first-team preseason All-Americans. Ott burst onto the national scene as a freshman in 2009, establishing an LSU schoolrecord with 16 saves. He struck out 69 and walked

just six in 50.1 innings of work. Pettis had a strong 2009 season where he had a 5-2 record with a 3.86 ERA and 17 saves, while striking out 37 batters in 42 innings. He walked just seven, while allowing 18 earned runs.

Among the other most notable nominees are the three relief pitching members of the NCBWA preseason All-American second team (Ryan Duke of Oklahoma, Chris Franklin of Southeastern Louisiana and Tyler Mizenko of Winthrop), along with all four members of the third team (Mitchell Lambson of Arizona State, Colin Bates of North Carolina, Collin Cargill of Southern Miss and Michael Schum of Wright State).

The Big 12 Conference led the way with five players named to the preseason watch list. The ACC, Conference USA and the SEC had four pitchers each on this year's watch list, while the Pacific-10 Conference is represented by three players.

TREY HILLMAN TO HAVE JERSEY NUMBER RETIRED MAY 8

The UT Arlington baseball program will retire former Maverick and current Kansas City Royals manager Trey Hillman's No. 1 jersey prior to the first pitch of UT Arlington's May 8 game against Stephen F. Austin at Clay Gould Ballpark.

Hillman, the only three-time All-Southland Conference selection in UTA history, will be in attendance for the ceremony as the Kansas City Royals are schedule to take on the Texas Rangers at the Ballpark in Arlington May 6-9.

"It is a great honor, especially to join the only other two people who have had their numbers retired," Hillman said. "I have great memories playing at UTA and Arlington will always be my hometown. I'm looking forward to coming back and being able to share that day with everyone at UT Arlington."

After a four-year career with the Mavericks, Hillman signed a free agent contract with the Cleveland Indians. Hillman later returned to UT Arlington where he earned a bachelor's degree

in exercise science and sport studies in 1991.

One of the top players in UT Arlington history, Hillman became the first Maverick baseball player inducted into the UT Arlington Athletic Hall of Honor in 1992. Hillman's .442 batting average in 1985 — which led the Southland Conference — remains the top single-season batting average in UTA history and is the second best average in Southland Conference history.

After completing his professional playing career in the Cleveland Indians' minor league system in 1987, Hillman spent one season scouting with the Indians before becoming the youngest minor league manager at that time with the New York Yankees Class-A club in the Carolina League. He then spent 12 years managing in the Yankees minor league system from 1990-2001.

After one season as the director of player development with the Texas Rangers, Hillman accepted a managerial position with the Hokkaido Nippon-Ham Fighters in Japan. During five seasons in Japan, the Nippon-Ham Fighters made three playoff appearances (2004, 2006, 2007), which includes winning the 2006 Japan Series championship and the 2006 Asian Championship. It was the first title for the Nippon-Ham Fighters franchise since 1962.

Hillman's (1982-85) No. 1 jersey will join former head coach Butch McBroom (No. 30) and the late former player, assistant coach and head coach Clay Gould (No. 8) as the only jersey numbers retired in UT Arlington baseball history.

ALABAMA HOSTS GEORGIA AT REGIONS PARK

The Alabama baseball team will host the Georgia Bulldogs in a non-conference game at Regions Park on March 3.

Alabama and Georgia will not meet during SEC play this season, so the two head coaches got together last season and set up this two-game non-conference series the next two years. The two teams are also scheduled to meet in Gwinnett, Ga., during the 2011 season and will be recognized as Georgia's home game.

"We've always had good series with Georgia," Alabama head coach Mitch Gaspard said. "We like playing them and they like playing us. We feel like both teams get better. That was something that came about last year. We had an open date and they did as well. They roll off the (SEC) schedule this year, actually the next two years, so we got with (Georgia coach) David Perno and said let's play a single game. We are playing one in Hoover this year and next year we are going to Gwinnett (Ga.) and play them at the Triple-A park."

DENNIS DUNNING TO RETIRE FROM TOMMIE BASEBALL

Dennis Denning, a legendary baseball coach in Minnesota for parts of five decades, announced plans to retire from the University of St. Thomas, effective Feb. 1, 2010.

Denning took the St. Thomas baseball program to new heights during the last 15 seasons. His Tommie teams won NCAA Division III championships in 2001 and 2009 and claimed national runner-up finishes in 1999 and 2000.

Denning, who recently turned 65, won 80 percent of his games and recorded 901 victories at St. Thomas (1995-2009) and Cretin-Derham Hall (1978-94). At St. Thomas, his 522-157 overall record (.769 win percentage) was the best mark since 1995 among all NCAA Division III coaches.

In each of the last 14 seasons, the Tommies have won either the regular-season or postseason title in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC).

Prior to his Tommie era, he was head coach for 17 seasons at nearby Cretin-Derham Hall High School, where his Raider teams won six Minnesota state large-class championships, 15 St. Paul City Conference titles, and amassed a 379-76 record (.833).

Denning took St. Thomas baseball on an historic trip to Havana, Cuba in January 2000 — only the third American professional or collegiate team to play in Cuba since Fidel Castro came to power nearly 40 years earlier. St. Thomas played two exhibition games against the University of Havana and hosted a return trip by a Cuban team in May 2000 that featured a game at the

Minneapolis Metrodome.

"I've said it often, but Dennis is the best," said St. Thomas athletics director Steve Fritz. "We knew we had something special when we hired him, and the results over these last 15 years speak for themselves."

Fritz said St. Thomas expects to soon appoint an interim head coach for the 2010 season, and in fall 2010 open a search for a full-time coach.

"It takes a lot to run a successful college program," Denning explained. "The coaching, recruiting and administrative tasks are a 12-month commitment and take an extraordinary amount of time and energy. Frankly, I don't have the energy today to do the job at the standard I feel it deserves.

"It seems like just yesterday I left Cretin and put together our first recruiting classes with guys like Buzz Hannahan and Chris Olean. I'll be forever grateful to the players, the coaches, the alumni, the parents, and my St. Thomas colleagues for helping us build a baseball program we could all be proud of."

ALL-CANADIAN COLLEGE TEAM ANNOUNCED

Jesse Sawyer of Calgary, led vote getters to be selected as the CanadianBaseballNetwork. com player of the year.

The South Dakota State Jackrabbits third baseman had 33 first-place votes and was

named on 43 of 49 ballots in voting for the 10th annual All-Canadian college team honouring the best of the 711 Canadians playing south of the border at NCAA Div I, II, II, NAIA and NJCAA schools.

Sawyer, a product of the Prairie Baseball Academy, hit .346 with 19 homers and 58 RBIs in 56 games for the South Dakota State and in one stretch Sawyer homered in 11 of 13 games.

Joining Sawyer on the 10th annual all-Canadian team and the runner-up in voting was first baseman first baseman Brent Lavallee (of North Delta, B.C. of LSU-Shreveport. Lefty James Paxton of Ladner, B.C. and the Kentucky Wildcats, who was selected 37th over-all by the Toronto Blue Jays, earned the spot on the first team.

The rest of the infield includes second baseman Kevin Mailloux of Windsor, Ont. of the Canisius College Griffs and Vancouver shortstop David Narodowski of the Kansas Jayhawks. The all-Canadian right-hander is Ottawa's Matt McGovern of the North Carolina-Pembroke Braves; while Luis Castillo of Burlington, Ont. from the Bellevue Bruins and Shawn Hetherington of Tsawassen, B.C. of the British Columbia Thunderbirds shared the closer's role finishing in a tie.

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2010 COLLEGE BASEBALL HALL OF FAME INDUCTEE BIOS

ALAN BANNISTER

Shortstop • Arizona State • 1970-1972

Bannister was named as the shortstop on *Baseball America*'s "All-Time College All-Star Team" in 1994. He was a two-time, First Team All-American and a two-time All-WAC performer. A .355 career hitter, he helped lead the Sun Devils to the 1972 College World Series with his .380 average, 13 home runs and 90 RBI and played 12 seasons in the Major Leagues.

BOB BENNETT

Head Coach • Fresno State • 1977-2002

Bennett recorded 1,300 career wins, the ninth-leading all-time total and seventh at the time he retired. He led Fresno State to 26 consecutive winning seasons beginning in 1977. He also made two NCAA World Series appearances in 1988 and 1991 and paced the Bulldogs to their first No.1 ranking in 1988. He was NCAA Coach of the Year in 1988 and won conference Coach of the Year 14 times while coaching 31 players that reached the Majors.

DR. EDDY FURNISS

First Baseman • LSU • 1995-98

Furniss culminated a sterling four-year career by receiving the 1998 Dick Howser Trophy along with SEC career records for hits (349), home runs (80), RBI (309), doubles (87), and total bases (689). In NCAA annals, he finished his career No. 3 all-time in total bases, No. 4 in home runs and doubles, and No. 5 in RBI. He posted a .371 lifetime batting average and hit .403 in 1998 with 27 doubles, three triples, 28 homers, 85 runs and 76 RBI to rning first-team all-America and all-SEC honors. He was also voted a second-team Academic all-American with a 3.5 gpa in zoology. In 1997, Furniss helped lead LSU to its second straight NCAA title, earning second-team all-America and all-SEC recognition and first-team Academic all-America honors. He batted .377 with 25 doubles, 17 homers and 77 RBI. Furniss, a 1996 consensus first-team all-America, was voted the '96 Southeastern Conference Player of the Year after batting .374 (89-for-238) with a school-record 26 homers and an SEC-record 103 RBI.

DON HEINKEL

Pitcher • Wichita State • 1979-82

Heinkel remains as the winningest pitcher in NCAA Divison I history with 51 victories (the overall college baseball record of 53 victories is held by Matt DeSalvo of NCAA Div III Marietta). He was named All-Missouri Valley Conference three times and was a first-team All-America selection in 1982 when he helped the Shockers to the NCAA South Regional championship and their first appearance in the College World Series by posting a 16-5 record. He threw a seven-inning no-hitter against Illinois as a frosh in '79 and had a career ERA of 2.75 in 39-plus post-season innings. Heinkel also was a first team College Sports Information Directors of America ESPN the Magazine Academic All-America and the first Wichita State student-athlete to be the recipient of an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship. His career totals included the 51 victories, 12 losses, 2.62 ERA, 66 starts, 39 complete games, eight shutouts, 467 innings, and 354 strikeouts.

WALLY KINCAID

Head Coach • Cerritos College •1958-77, 79-80

Kincaid was named National Community College Coach of the Century for the 2000s and compiled a record of 678-163 for an .806 winning percentage. He also had the Cerritos baseball field named in his honor, led his teams to a record six California State Championships, won six Southern and one Northern California Championships, guided his teams to 15 individual conference championships in three difference conference, and won 51 different tournament championships. He later was assistant coach for three NCAA World Series teams at Long Beach State.

DAVE MAGADAN

First Baseman • Alabama • 1981-83

Magadan was the USA Baseball 1983 Golden Spikes Award Winner, *Baseball America* Player of the Year, 1982-1983 Southeastern Conference Male Athlete of the Year, and named first baseman on the Fans Only All-Time Crimson Tide Baseball Team. He paced the team in hits and RBI all three seasons and helped Alabama make it to the '83 NCAA championship against Texas and College Hall of Fame coach Cliff Gustafson. His .439 career batting average is still the SEC record as he went 268-for-610 with 64 doubles, 14 homers and 188 RBI. Magadan batted a school record .525 to lead the nation as a senior and left the school with six career records. As a junior he helped the Crimson Tide roll to a 46-11 mark and second place in the CWS. He currently is the hitting coach for the Boston Red Sox.

GEORGE SISLER

Outfielder/Pitcher • Michigan

Sisler paced the Wolverines to a 22-4-1 record as a sophomore in 1913 and led the team in batting with a .445 mark. Pitching records for his era were sketchy, but he was proclaimed Michigan's top college pitcher by *The Sporting News*. The stats that are listed show him with at least 38 innings pitched, nine hits allowed, 53 strikeouts, and just seven walks in the five recorded starts. A year later, he helped UM top Southern powers Kentucky, Alabama and Georgia. Michigan was 7-1 with Sisler hitting .434 and stealing eight bases. In 1915 Sisler batted .451 with one streak of nine consecutive hits and made Vanity Fair magazine's popular All-America team in his final two years. He is considered the St. Louis Browns/Baltimore Orioles' greatest hitter during a 16-year MLB career with a .340 all-time average and Cooperstown Hall of Fame credentials.

B.J. SURHOFF

Catcher • North Carolina • 1983-85

Surhoff was 1985 *Sporting News* National Player of the Year, '84 first team All-America, a member of the famed 1984 U.S. Olympic team, No. 1 selection by Baltimore in the 1985 in 1985 MLB draft, a three-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference catcher, 1984-85 ACC Athlete of the Year, a member of the ACC's 50th Anniversary Team (the Top 50 players in ACC history), and a sparkplug for the Tar Heels' ACC championship teams in 1984 and '85.

CHARLES TEAGUE


Second Baseman • Wake Forest • 1947-50

Teague was a standout for four seasons and the school's first baseball All-America in 1947. He topped the Southern Conference in hitting that year with a .353 average and later led Wake to the 1949 NCAA finals where the team lost to Texas 10-3. Teague was named All-NCAA World Series and MVP for the '49 CWS. He was first team All-America again in 1949 and '50 and is one of there NCAA Division I players to be selected first team A-A in three seasons. The three-time All-Southern Conference pick and SC Player of the Year had a career .335 average, with 495 AB, 119 R, 166 hits, 27 doubles, 13 triples, six homers, and 99 RBI.

RICHARD WORTHAM

Pitcher • Texas • 1973-76

Wortham was a lefthander who was the first 50-game winner in NCAA history. He still is the second-winningest hurler behind Heinkel with a 50-7 career worksheet. He tossed 456 career innings, recorded 12 career shutouts and 481 strikeouts. He was All-Southwest Conference in 1973 and 1976 and led UT to four SWC titles. He also hurled a four-hitter for the win against South Carolina in 1975 NCAA title game. The two-time All-America played in the bigs for both the Chicago White Sox and Oakland Athletics.


